

Visitors' favorites include:

- Traditional artisans who demonstrate crafts in the style of the 18th century using only materials and methods available at that time. Learn how baskets were made, wooden tubs formed, tools created by blacksmiths, and much more.
- Over 50 different French, English and Native American foods adapted from original recipes prepared over open fires and served by costumed participants. Traditional favorites include fry bread, forfar bridies, and buffalo.
- Blanket traders and merchants sell replicas of 18th century trade goods from blankets and tents. Products for sale include colonial goods, period clothing, toys, Native American items, pewter, leather, wood, and woven goods.
- The Native American Living Village and camps of the military re-enactors, colorful voyageurs, and the Habitants. The Habitants were the French settlers who left civilization, friends, and families to settle in this remote part of New France.

Pets are not permitted on the event grounds; assistance animals may accompany their owners.

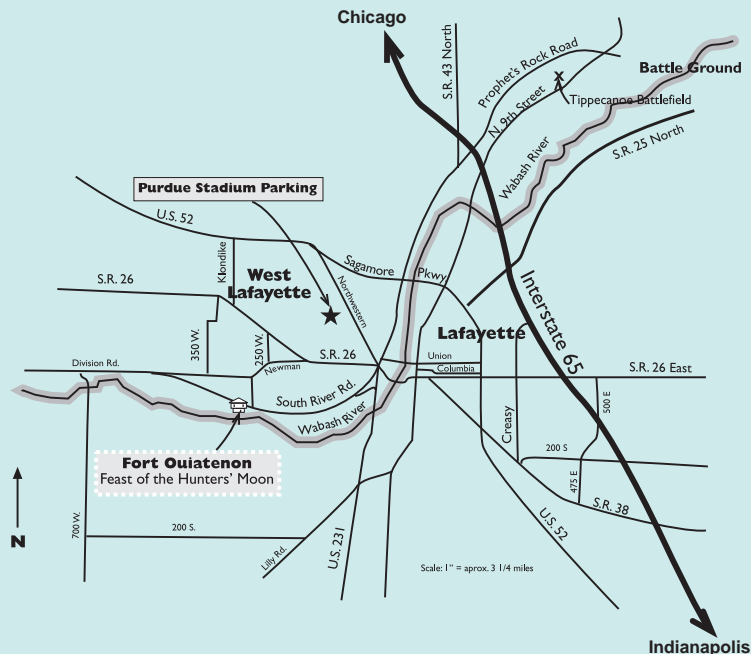
